VED from VICTORIA INSTITUTIONS entered some British discussion boards not to debate politics in the usual sense, but to warn of a hidden danger: the slow, unnoticed infiltration of 'feudal' language structures into English societies through mass immigration, multiculturalism, and unchecked cultural exchange.

With unflinching clarity, he argued that English is far more than a means of communication—it is a unique social software that bestows dignity, equality, and individual freedom on its speakers. In contrast, many non-English languages embed hierarchies of respect and contempt in every pronoun, verb form, and address, splintering societies into invisible layers of superiority and subordination.

Drawing on personal observation, historical insight, and provocative analogies, these collected writings—originally posted between 2004 and 2007—explore:


- Why English nations historically outshone others despite smaller populations and resources
