


George W. This edition features original commentary, which uncovers concealed social dynamics, draws striking parallels to feudal language structures in South Asia, scrutinizes colonial and missionary influences, and exposes the perils of stratified societies—including how the English, when functioning in close alliance with other white settler groups, became complicit in continental European-style brutality toward indigenous peoples, even without direct participation or personal endorsement—providing a bold, alternative perspective on history, fate, and the engineered forces shaping humanity.
